

A Vicar's View

Giant-sized: Problems or Opportunities?

The Lord said to Moses, 'Send some men to explore the land of Canaan, which I am giving to the Israelites. From each ancestral tribe send one of its leaders.' So at the Lord's command Moses sent them out from the Desert of Paran. All of them were leaders of the Israelites. [...] Then Caleb silenced the people before Moses and said, 'We should go up and take possession of the land, for we can certainly do it.'



I...I Joshua son of Nun and Caleb son of Jephunneh, who were among those who had explored the land, tore their clothes and said to the entire Israelite assembly. The land we passed through and explored is exceedingly good. If the Lord is pleased with us, he will lead us into that land, a land flowing with milk and honey, and will give it to us. Only do not rebel against the Lord. And do not be afraid of the people of the land, because we will devour them. Their protection is gone, but the Lord is with us. Do not be afraid of them. (Numbers 13:1–3, 30: 14:6–10)

The Annual Report is an opportunity for to look back and see the God-journey of last year, and to look forward to see and imagine the next part of our journey with God, as His people at St Margaret's. It is this dynamic that reminds me of the story of God sending the 12 spies into the Promised Land way before they possessed it.

It was called 'The Promised Land' because of God's promise to Abraham: "I am the Lord, who brought you out of Ur of the Chaldeans, to give you this land to take possession of it" (Gen15:7, see also Gen15:18-21). As Whitney Wollard, writing for The Bible Project, puts it: This land that God promised [...] is not simply a geographical backdrop, it acts as a picture of covenant faithfulness as God's people try to live out their divine calling. God is the one who promises, and we are called to be faithful and walk into his promises with confidence that He will always be good to them.

In the story of the twelve spies, ten spies could only see the giant problems in the land and thus were defeated before they even began. Two spies (Joshua and Caleb) could see giant opportunities by seeing what God could see: a land flowing with milk and honey. Though all of them could not imagine how God could give them the land, yet they all knew that God had parted the sea for them and had guided them with a pillar of cloud by day and a pillar of fire by night. And yet, ten of them could not allow God's past action to inform their trust in His future purposes. Fortunately, two of them could see and sadly they were the only two that survived to see God's people step across the Jordan on dry land and into the Promised Land.

How Joshua and Caleb behaved is the enduring picture of faith. We remember what God has done in order that we may have courage for what God will do in the future. God is always faithful to his promises which He performs through us to His glory.

Bishop Ross was delighted and it was wonderful to have a church full to the brim of new and returning people. There was a great sense of optimism and a lovely time of past and present members coming together.
- We also saw the appointment of Warren Duncan as our new Director of Worship.

August

- Saw the start of our Monthly Midweek Communion Service & Invitational Lunch led by Linda Duncan, Kay Durrans and Jim Peacock.
- Our first large LCD Screen was installed in the church sanctuary.

September

- Our Young Adults enjoy a weekend away retreat.
- Alpha Course starts with 7 guests.
- Bishop Ross extended Rev Emily Paterson's partially funded curacy through to the end of 2024.
- I was also laid low with some cardiac issues which, by God's grace, is now under control. Thank you to everyone who stepped up to serve.

October

- Our Men's group went on a mission trip to Great Barrier Island where they
 ministered to and with the local Anglican Church. There they saw the LORD
 do a significant work of healing and reconciliation in that church.
- Our CAP Debt Centre had an amazing fund-raising dinner with moving testimonies of God's work in people's lives.

November

- Vestry agrees to engage the work of Redeemer City to City for 2024 onwards.
- Our iServe campaign saw many volunteer to serve in the life and many ministries of the Church.

December

- Our second large LCD screen was installed in the sanctuary in time for our Christmas celebrations.
- We celebrated Christmas with the church full of life and visitors.
- We also helped with the Carols in the Park in Three Kings Domain.

Throughout the year we welcomed new people every week and our Newcomers Lunches were very popular. What an amazing year!

2024 - What God Will Do!

When we look forwards, we do so knowing that God always has plans for His Church which are for our good and His glory (Jeremiah 29:11). The job we have is to be still enough to discern what He is saying. It is therefore vital that we become even more a people of prayer.

Prayer & Prophecy. Amos 3:7-8 says that God does nothing without first revealing his plans to his servants the prophets. Hearing God's voice is the most important thing we can do. It comes from creating a space for Him to speak as we pray. We will continue to press into the space of prayer. We want to continue to develop our prayer life as a community. While individual prayer is really important, there also seems to be a special thing that God does when his people gather to prayer together. This year can I encourage you to attend at least one Church Prayer Meeting a month? Perhaps you could also help us develop different spaces and expressions of corporate prayer. This year, we will be hosting another 24/7 Prayer Week in late May. Come join us in prayer and listen to the voice of God with us.

Revisioning and Equipping the Saints. 2024 will see us working with Redeemer City to City (Australia) (CTC) with our Lead Consultant, Rev Jamie Bester. CTC is a Church Consultancy organisation that aims to revitalise local churches for the work for the kingdom. Their expertise includes leadership coaching, vision distillation, church systems enhancement, evangelism training, preaching development, and setting accountable and realistic goals. They will work with us for an initial two years, with the potential for a five-year partnership. This year they will help us to discover a refreshed vision for St Margaret's which will inform everything that we do and help us to set accountable and achievable goals.

Lynfield Community Church. The Lynfield Community Church will be joining us at the beginning of May. We will together, become one worshipping body under the banner of St Margaret's. It is our intention that within 12 months we will be planting a new morning service back into Lynfield with a new church planting team. Will God be sending you? We will be looking for people to commit themselves to serving and growing the church in Lynfield.

Regen24. As part of a wider vision to be a blessing to the NZ Church, we will be the venue for the ACM Regen24 conference. This conference is a chance for anybody to be inspired by a greater vision, equipped by great teaching and blessed by the worship and Holy Spirit ministry times. This is our opportunity to give ourselves afresh to the work of God.

Teaching, Training & Leadership. Over the next year we will be aiming to explore opportunities for deeper teaching and training in theology and the ministry of the Holy Spirit. This will be available to people outside of St Margaret's with the possibility of us becoming a Northern Training Hub where leaders can be grown and equipped. We will also be looking at developing and training a church planting team and will be growing our musical worship as a church.

Staffing. We will need to grow the staff team (clergy and lay) ahead of these developments so that we may be able to grow into all that God has ordained for us to be. We hope to retain the services of Rev Emily beyond 2024.



Conclusion. In all these things we look to the Lord who calls us into the things he has already ordained to happen. Our job is to keep looking at him and be sensitive enough to hear the changes he may want to make. As Joshua and Caleb said: "If the Lord is pleased with us, he will lead us into that land, a land flowing with milk and honey, and will give it to us."

This will take faith and commitment, knowing that there may be battles ahead, but the Lord is the one who has the victory. As our mission statement says, we are to 'Go and make Jesus known and see lives transformed'. It is by his Spirit and our obedience and faith that we will see this happen. But we must go...

May this be our prayer:

Father, here I am. I am willing to go. Send me and use me for your glory. Do such things through us that makes your reputation glorious and shows your name to be great. Amen.

They remained diligent in their management of finances and property, ensuring their appropriate handling. Throughout this year, Vestry was aware of God's guiding hand in building His church.

St. Margaret's main highlight this year was the grand Centennial celebration in July, marking a significant milestone for the church. This momentous occasion dominated the first half of our calendar and was a resounding success, blending celebration with reflection as we thanked God for His constant presence over 101 years.

In honouring this milestone, we acknowledged those who came before us, and their vision, and dedication to Jesus's teachings. Their legacy paved the way for the jubilant Centenary day. Looking to the future with hope, the celebration inspired us to spread God's love, ensuring all encountering St. Margaret's are blessed. The Centenary showcased our community's strength, members' faithfulness, and God's guiding grace. It served as a reminder of our mission, renewing our commitment as we step into the next chapter of St. Margaret's history with gratitude and purpose.

The Vestry extends heartfelt gratitude to the Centennial Working Group for their tireless efforts in making the celebration truly unforgettable and also thanks everyone who played a part in this momentous event for their contributions. Your dedication and support are deeply appreciated.

The following is a summary of the major pieces of business Vestry attended to in 2023. The Vestry approved the following:

- the deposit of \$100,000 with Christian Savings Bank for an initial period of one year at the applicable fixed term rate (currently set as 5.4%pa).
- the St Margaret's mortgage Loan (Ref 225.1) is to have a floating rate for the next 12 months.
- budget \$20k extra mortgage payments for the next 12 months, which will be dispersed quarterly and will equate to \$5k per quarter.
- the appointing of a Director of Worship and allocation of extra funding to enable the position to be half-time.
- the application for a faculty from the Diocese of Auckland for the installation of a 101 centennial plaque to be installed in the church foyer.
- to enter into negotiations and discussions with the Parish of Lynfield Community Church and the Bishop of Auckland regarding a possible church revitalisation project.
- the installation of the second screen in the church and to approach the church for an appeal to support this project.
- to engage in a discernment process with City to City (Australia) to determine if we would engage them as church consultants. (Vestry subsequently agreed to an initial 2-year consultancy period with an option to extend it to 5 years.)

In closing, we extend our sincere thanks to everyone who dedicated their time to serve on the Vestry this year. We wish the new Vestry a successful and fulfilling year ahead in 2024.


In July, it was a great joy to welcome Warren Duncan as Director of Worship. He very quickly settled in and is already extending and developing the worship and media teams, especially the participation of some junior youth in serving on both worship and tech teams.

Our Centennial celebration at the end of July was the culmination of a lot of hard work from staff, vestry and volunteers to bring together a memorable day. We cleaned, gardened, decorated, cooked, created visual displays: just some of the background preparations for a joyous gathering, worship and reunion. Bishop Ross Bay officiated at the service and later unveiled a plaque commemorating 101 years in the Hillsborough community. Sharing stories and being reminded of what we have been entrusted with from those who helped shape the church to where we are today.

The Op shop in Onehunga continues to serve the community where there is evidence of real needs so is perfectly positioned to fulfill this ministry. Sarah and the small team of volunteers (both church and community) are well known by many local customers. Being volunteers it can be quite a challenge for Sarah to cover all the shifts, so additional church support is always needed to best support this ministry.

As we open up to more activities outside regular office and church hours, it is becoming apparent there is a need for a Verger to manage building security rather than total reliance on the Vicar, so we will continue to seek someone to step into this limited scope position.

Each year the staff and vestry look at how to live out our vision statement and consider how to extend our vision beyond current activities. Late last year we elected to become one of the AFFIRM parishes to engage with the City to City Australia consultancy services who will work alongside us on this revisioning journey. Work is already underway with an initial church-wide survey and interviews so we eagerly anticipate this next season and where God is taking us.



Alfred and Punitha Luther have been faithful in continuing to supply great food and hospitality as well a faith pastoral field workers. Alfred has cooked and delivered meals to some of our CAP clients and members of the church all year. They have also catered for our events at Easter, Christmas and Newcomers Lunches. Sarah McDermott has managed the Op Shop for over 7 years. This year the shop saw a record turnover of over \$100,000! She has done this while struggling with limited volunteers and overwhelming donations. The Thursday Sorting Team seems to be a hive of activity and laughter! Her voluntary hours are filled with prayer meetings, the flower roster, helping at services and many other things. Rev Emily Paterson, our Associate Priest (and busy mum) continues to grow in confidence and ability. Her preaching is stunning. She continued to oversee a growing young adults ministry, has mentored our new part-time staff, and willingly and with great gifting, put her hand to the many demands of parish and wider church life. The state of the s A CONTRACTOR OF THE PARTY OF TH Juliette Porter joined the staff team for a year as our Childrens' Ministry team leader while also in her final year of her Law and Theology degrees. Through her enthusiasm and hard work we saw new life breathed into our Children's Sunday ministry. Rev George and Janet Stonehouse remain a constant source of Godly wisdom and encouragement. Their insights and pastoral heart have helped support many people through the year. Wardens. Our church wardens, Tony Mitchell and Muriel McIntyre, are honorary staff members. We have all appreciated their wisdom, constancy and encouragement throughout the year. All our staff willingly give far more hours to the work of the Church than those for which they are paid. The challenge is to encourage them to rest and to develop others who they can train and release into greater fruitfulness to the glory of God's name. Well done good and faithful servants.

Great things He has done





The last year has seen a large number of repairs and maintenance items addressed. Whilst there was no focus or advancement of the asbestos roof replacement, air quality tests have been conducted and the monies set aside for the replacement remain allocated in the budget. I expect to see a renewed emphasis on addressing this major building item in the coming years.

During the year many smaller items were addressed either by friendly subcontractors (Auckland Plumbing Group) or by teams of dedicated parishioners. A big thankyou to lan McIntyre and Terry Ryan who with their teams have done a whole lot of work behind the scenes.



Significant items addressed in 2023:

Overhead Screen Displays (Dual OHP)

Following the success of the 1st 85" commercial display screen, installed in time for the 101 celebrations, a second screen to match was installed just prior to the Christmas services.

A big thank you to those who made this happen.

Air Condition Units

Several air conditioning units failed during the year. These were at 'end of life' and replaced. The one needed in the crèche will hopefully be installed prior to winter 2024.

Church Building Lighting

Terry's team continues the systematic replacement of the fluorescent lights with modern LED fittings. The difference where they have been installed is remarkable. The hall fittings were also 'rejuvenated' by me retrofitting new LED fittings into the existing lighting reflectors. Two high bay end fitting are yet to be completed.

Pigeons

The church pigeon roosting issue has an on-going solution by an occasional night shot for the armchair hunters in the parish. If you want to be involved, please let me know.

Hall Acoustic Tiles

A team of installers glued the ground level acoustic tiles around the hall. This has completed the amount of acoustic deadening planned for that space.

Repairs to Kitchen

Various appliances have been replaced in the Kitchen.

Ongoing Maintenance Plan

This has been revised and priorities added, primarily by Ian Goodwin but agreed to by the property and finance working group.

I would like to thank all those who participated in making the church buildings and surroundings look so good both for the 101 celebration and the 2023 Christmas services. This year we will be hosting some conference functions and expect plenty of visitors. I trust the same level of presentation will be afforded these events.































Reaching Up

Preaching Fraser McDermott

Our hope is that everyone has a regular habit of reading scripture and allowing the inspired Word of God to influence and direct our lives. Our gathering on a Sunday is a chance for us together to:

- a) be inspired and transformed by God's Word in scripture;
- b) find a common vision and purpose as the People of God;
- c) draw closer to God and one another, and;
- d) allow a hunger for God's word to propel us into the world as agents of the Kingdom through His empowering presence.

Throughout the year we vary our Sunday messages through preaching overarching biblical themes, and books of the Bible, trying to look into both the Old and New Testament. Our aim is to build confidence in the integrity and relevance of scripture to our lives and give everyone the ability to be able to study the Word in groups and individually.

We continued to enjoy the development of home-grown speakers from within the church fellowship as well as a few guests from outside the church. Thank you to all our speakers this year who delivered with eloquence and prayerfulness.

Our preaching series in 2023 were:

God's Story, My Story

We invited different people from with our fellowship to share their journey of faith into Jesus and in following Jesus. We started this series in Summer Church and then at different times through the year. The purpose of the series was to get to know one another a bit more and to give each one of us the confidence to be able to share our story of faith with each other and with others who we may meet in our daily lives.



Kingdom Parables

We enjoyed an extended series on Jesus' parables on the Kingdom of God. In his ministry, Jesus preached and demonstrated the reality and presence of the Kingdom of God — God's rule. 'The time has come,' he said. 'The Kingdom of God has come near. Repent and believe the good news!' (Mark 1:15). His message announced the

Kingdom, his parables explained the kingdom, and his miracles bore witness to the presence of the Kingdom of God on earth right now. We encouraged one another to be shaped as Kingdom People, impacting our everyday values, attitudes, and priorities.

Mission Sundays

We also like to keep external mission fresh in our hearts and minds and so we heard from our own people and invited guest speakers from different agencies we may be supporting to hear of God's work beyond our boundaries. This year we heard from: Juliette Porter, on her mission to an unknown location in Asia; Michael Mysolla and Andrey Borro on a summer mission week in Nelson; our mission to Bangladesh team and Operation Mobilisation; Chris Ayres from Pioneers NZ; Jolene from her long term work in the Middle East, and; Peter & Karen Brookes from CMCT (India).



Living Hope — Studies in 1 Peter

This series was born out of the concept that, as Kingdom people, we are agents/carriers of hope in a troubled world. If we do not understand this all-encompassing hope across all fields and disciplines of our lives, we will find that our light will shine very dimly in the world. We will also be easily side-swiped by life's changes and chances
















Thursday Prayer Meeting

Even to your old age and grey hairs I am He, I am He who will sustain you. I have made you and I will carry you. I will sustain you and I will rescue you. I saiah 46:4




Future Building:

From June 2023 we welcomed Warren Duncan as the Director of Praise & Worship to continue the work that God has been doing across our Music & Sound departments. Since joining he has been focused on implementing team growth through relationship building, encouraging youth participation, and developing musical abilities with the aim to elevate the standard of praise and worship in our church.

Branching out from this vision, we as a team identified the need to encourage more of our youth & young adults to get involved while building on the relational strengths that the team already carried.

Standing in agreement, we prayed that God would partner with us to see the fulfilment of this. We are happy to see that there has been progress made in this area; we've welcomed 7 new/ returning members all of whom are regularly involved on a weekly, fortnightly, or monthly basis.



We anticipate a greater year ahead with the building blocks we as a team have put in place and look forward to seeing more of what GOD will grow within us.









Sound Team

Our Sound Team has taken some big strides in the right direction coming from the end of 2023 into 2024. Our group has experienced growth in size, understanding and focus as we partner with the Music Team to deliver quality praise and worship experiences for every service. In Psalm 98:4-6 David rejoices in the Lord through musical expressions with shouts of joy, sounds of singing and instruments being played "before the Lord, the King." We aspire to embody this expression by being excellent in our delivery of quality sound support to our musical ministry as well as ensuring a consistent flow for our service leaders, preachers, and ministers alike.

Acknowledgement must first be given to those who have remained steady in service for our Sound Team. Having the likes of Sindy- Leigh Urima, Tony Mitchell, Abraham Victor, and Augustine Cadelis giving of their time to this department has been a blessing. The tail end of 2023 (after the iServe Sundays) presented us with the opportunity to grow our team, with the injection of some younger members stepping up to the call. We have been able to welcome on board Tez Hubert, William Scott, Azubah Fonua and Fraser Baird all of whom are bright prospects to carry the standard of our team forward.

In the month of February 2024 our Praise and Worship Director Warren Duncan held a workshop with the younger members of the team to guide them through their responsibilities and equip them with some useful insight into the role. As we progress in 2024, we are welcoming the opportunities to push our youth forward in their involvement within the team while tapping into the knowledge the longer-serving team members can offer. Reaching Out

Tithe & Mission Giving

St Margaret's has a longstanding policy of tithing 10% of parish income in line with Biblical principles. We are very privileged to be able to do this. It is such a joy to be able to support individuals and groups, knowing that it makes a difference to not only the recipient, but to others who come to know of Christ and whose lives are impacted through them.

This year we have undertaken, and completed a review of all donations to ensure we have a considered approach to ongoing funding. We have set processes in place so that there is an even and broad distribution of funds; overseas, nationally and locally.

Due to gift day donations and increased giving through rising congregational numbers we had more money to allocate this year.

Approximately half the funds available support our overseas and local mission partners. We were able to give them a small increase in support for the first time in several years, due to the increased giving.

We have distributed funds to local and national initiatives and are in the process of completing due diligence with other organisations that we have identified as possible recipients.

Mission Support

Alfred Luther

The year 2023 began with the preparation for a short-term mission trip to Bangladesh. It was in February 2023 that a team of six from our congregation put up their hands to volunteer to go on a mission support journey along with Operation Mobilisation, New Zealand to Bangladesh in May 2023.

St Margaret's Church in partnership with Operation Mobilisation (OM, NZ) is helping equip and educate over 100 children in Bangladesh. Our partnership with OM will enable Christians across Bangladesh to grow spiritually and will strengthen local church leadership. This mission helped meet urgent needs of the under privileged and spread Jesus' love across Bangladesh.

Christmas Appeal 2023

We continue our mission through the Anglican Missions, New Zealand, to provide "Water for All" for the communities in Fiji, with a particular focus on improving rural communities' access to clean water. Water tanks (which come with their stands and fittings) will be installed using local labour and locally sourced materials. More than 200 people in six or seven villages will directly benefit from the safe, accessible and consistent supply of water that these tanks will provide. St Margaret's church partnering with Anglican missions, New Zealand to make a difference.

Partnering with St Saviour's Church, Kaitaia

The Christmas appeal went well, providing 27 Kaitaia church families with \$80 food vouchers each presented in a personally addressed Christmas card. We continue to support them with Food Bank donations once a quarter.

Our Long-Term Mission Partner, Jolene D, continues to work in the Middle East despite some uncertainties a few months back. She has committed to continue to work with her team which has now reduced to just one other. Her vision is to see a movement of third generation believers who follow Jesus and are transformed by Him, who in turn lead others to Christ. She continues to work among women and children, however, her prayers are that more men would turn to Christ through the women, as one or two men show interests in studies with them. She was on a furlough in New Zealand recently and was re-commissioned for service in February 2024.

On a concluding note — it is the endeavour of the MSG not to relegate compassion and social justice to an optional afterthought of outreach and mission. We believe that a good understanding and practice of evangelism promotes an essential component of healthy corporate spirituality. We aim to achieve this by taking a bold and a radical leadership, moving the church 'into the world' (externally focussed) for those who are hungry for spiritual life, for those who are desperate for the life of God, to fill our church — all in the name of Christ and by His power.

Local Mission

As God's People, we are all called to mission, and we all desire to share the good news of Jesus with our family, friends, and local community. As a church we want to help resource and facilitate everyone in that. We have some specific ministries that are engaged in Local Mission (CAP, Alpha, the Op Shop), which will be reported on separately, so this report will focus on other events and initiatives that took place during 2023.

After many of our invitational events were halted during the covid years, it was wonderful to once again be able to gather and provide these opportunities for invitation in 2023. We held our Shrove Tuesday Pancake event at Church at the end of February and we held a 'just for fun' Quiz Night in November. Both were attended by some visitors.

Lion Yang co-ordinated our Church Choir which sang at our Easter Services as well as our Centenary Celebrations. This group provided an opportunity for some beyond the Church to participate and get to know our members. During Advent, our big focus was to invite people to our Christmas services. Our Women's Fellowship made shortbread and delivered it to our neighbours on Hillsborough Road along with an invitation to our Christmas Services. We also did a 'parish-wide' mailbox drop of invitations to our Christmas Services during December.

Throughout the year we had an ongoing focus on Jesus' call to 'Pursue the One.' As part of this, life groups were encouraged to do a 3-week course called 'Life Shared' during June. This course focused on evangelism and sharing our faith, and many took up the opportunity to do this.



We also work in partnership with several other local churches/ organisations with whom we share a common mission:

- In December we supported the local churches of Mt Roskill as they worked together to put on 'Carols at the Kings' at Three Kings Reserve. It was the 65th anniversary of this event, and wonderful that the council allowed a clear Christian focus to return to this event once again.
- We continue to support the ministry of New Hope Church in Onehunga and Roskill South Oasis Hub, particularly through the regular provision of meals for those to whom they minister. A few volunteers from St Margaret's also helped New Hope with the assembly of their Christmas Hampers in December last year.
- Some St Margaret's Church volunteers are part of the Prison Ministry Team of The New Zealand Tamil Christian Fellowship who gather for a fellowship service at the Auckland Prison. On the fourth Sunday of every month, the volunteers gather for a time of prayer and sharing the gospel in one of the units in the high security prison in Albany. It is encouraging to see ten to twelve inmates come regularly for this time of fellowship and prayer.

The Op Shop has a three-fold purpose: to spread the good news of Jesus Christ through word and action, to serve the local community with good quality items at a low price, and to provide income for St Margaret's.

In January, we started with a flood from a leaky roof but in February, unlike so many, we escaped pretty much unscathed from Cyclone Gabrielle. Happily shop life settled into its usual rhythm and the sense of godly community serving others continues to grow.

We are so thankful for our many volunteers, from church and from the local community. Our sorting team has grown again this year and we really enjoy our weekly time together, working and chatting, enjoying friendship and praying for one another's needs. On Sundays, our washing boxes stars have enjoyed the Laundry Bubbles game, where a number hidden in the box can be handed in to claim a prize!

At the shop, we see God using us to bless so many who come in, some enjoying a chat or being prayed for. Mid-year, we were glad to welcome another community work volunteer from the Drug and Other Addictions Treatment Court to the shop, who was a great blessing to us in his positive attitude and cheerful hard work. Our prayer for all our community work volunteers is that they might encounter God in us in a way that will impact them and foster a faith in Christ.



The Pay it Forward programme continues to bless many and, although donations have slowed down, we have enough to give clothes and household goods to those in need. While we often have people stealing, occasionally we have given them the goods that they were taking. We have been able to give these gifts as Pay it Forward donations and through this, we hope to show God's radical grace and generous provision — we always tell them there is no need to steal from us!

Pay it Forward has also continued to give towards the work of Alfred and his team as they deliver



The prayer requests box is used often and nearly every week we have some people to pray for at Lift, the Thursday prayer meeting. We have even had a couple of people come back to thank us and tell us how God has answered their prayers.

Taiana Filimone, as the Assistant Manager, is an indispensable strength to the team. As she serves so faithfully and willingly, she is an example to us all of servant leadership and I am so grateful to her for the incredible support she gives to me and to the shop. We are both so thankful for all who volunteer; at the shop or sorting room, to those who take washing home, who pray, who bring us coffee! You are helping to declare the goodness of God in so many ways.

In 2023 we ran Alpha on Wednesday evenings from July to September. We had eight guests including six from outside the church. Each session started with dinner at 6:30pm and we enjoyed delicious food prepared by Alfred or Sarah.

We used the Alpha Film Series in which hosts, Toby Flint and Gemma Hunt join Nicky Gumbel to unpack the basics of the Christian faith in an updated and engaging way. The guests agreed that the presentation was interesting and top quality.

Each night the video was followed by a group discussion in which everyone was encouraged to ask questions and say what they think.



When we run an Alpha course, we pray that the Lord will work in their lives progressively through the course. We pray that people will come to Christ and ask Him into their lives or that existing faith will be reawakened. We pray that they would encounter the Holy Spirit and His power. Praise God – we saw all of that happen over the course. And we saw new people coming to church after the course.

We'll be running Alpha again in 2024 starting at the end of April. We pray for more people to come. In the last course, everyone who came was invited by someone from St Margarets. The more people we get to know and invite to Alpha, the more people will come. Who can you invite and bring to Alpha?

CAP Debt Help Centre

We currently have 7 client families on a budget working towards becoming debtfree. Most of these will not be debt-free for at least another 2-3 years. We do have one family, however, that has paid off nearly all of their debt and they are due to reach their debt-free goal by April.

There are sadly always a number of clients who drop off at some stage of the journey. We are confident that the contact we have had with these people has been a positive experience for them and that they have been touched by God in some way.

One example is a woman who, after some months, was still unable to supply all the information we needed to create a budget for her and we reluctantly decided to close her account. She knows that she is welcome to return to us for assistance again at any point in the future. While we were working with her, she attended an event we held at the church and through this she got to know Sarah McDermott who now sees her quite regularly at Countdown, where the client works.

We now have around 10 church members who have attended client visits with me as "support friends" and have continued to follow these people up beyond our three official home visits. We have had several of our CAP families attend events at St Margaret's — the most recent of which was the Shrove Tuesday event which three of our CAP families attended.

We are currently looking at starting up CAP Money Courses as part of the service we offer. This is a course that runs over 3 sessions (once a week) for people wanting to gain basic budgeting skills. We are hoping to run a course in April and already have some people who have expressed interest in attending.

The cost of running our Debt Centre has always been a challenge. However, we ran a very successful fund-raising dinner in October at which we raised enough money to keep us going for the next year at least. It was also a great opportunity to hear from one of our clients who gave a moving account of his CAP journey and what it has meant to him and his family.

Reaching In

Children Juliette Porter

Coordinating the children's Sunday programme and overall ministry was definitely one of my highlights of 2023, although it was also a big learning curve. I was blessed that God provided (and continues to provide) an amazing team of volunteers who were committed to seeing the children not only have fun at kid's church but also grow in their relationship with God. In particular, Rachel Collis regularly led some of the Sunday morning sessions which gave me more time to plan, and also more space to settle into the role.

Over the year we had to be flexible as we gradually figured out how to run the programme in a way that works well and best suits the needs of the children. We initially kept all the children together in one big group, but as the number of both children and volunteers grew, we divided the children into groups of 3-5 year olds and 6-8 year olds in order to do lesson and activities that catered to their different abilities. We also started having morning tea together at the very beginning of the programme to give the children time to feel comfortable and get to know one another, and experimented with different ways of teaching memory verses and various games and activities. I was grateful for the volunteers' flexibility, support and feedback over the year, and for the constant encouragement and prayer from the staff.

Throughout 2023 we went through a lot of stories from the Old Testament, including the creation story, characters like Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, and the 10 Commandments. We also looked at topics like prayer and hearing God's voice, and allowed time to teach about important events in the church calendar, including Easter and Christmas. It was exciting to see the children grow in their knowledge of God and curiosity about him. Sometimes we had a hard time keeping up with all their questions! ('How does Jesus speak to people? Does he shout down from heaven?' 'How do we know that the stories about Jesus are true?' 'If Jesus' power goes out from him, how does he get it back?' 'Is heaven made from clouds?' etc...)

Overall, I was very grateful to see the way God worked in 2023 to bring the children closer to him and allow them to know him more. Looking forward to 2024!

Sunday Youth

In 2023 our Sunday morning Youth Programme met during the 10am service and included those aged 10-14 at school.

Before I begin I would to acknowledge the helpers who have taken the time for Sunday mornings to contribute to support our young people. Donald Titus; thank you for building and creating a relationship with our young people, Sharyn Elliffe; thank you for your patience and kindness in serving alongside myself and being a listening ear for our youth and to Sharon Mitchell; thank you for all the knowledge you have offered. So, thank you leaders for all that you have served and done.

During the first half of last year, the youth looked at stories from the Old Testament. Through these stories they were able to understand their faith and learn from the stories and what they taught about life, values and history. Then our youth worked through Youth Alpha. The youth really enjoyed youth alpha. Here is some of the feedback:

I really enjoyed it because it allowed me to see how others had perspective on who Jesus was and the questions really challenged my thinking so, I encourage other young people to try out Youth Alpha, especially if you want to grow a bit deeper."

This year, Karen Newton has joined the Sunday Morning Youth Leadership team. She has a background of teaching faith and also leading Sunday Schools. Having her by my side will allow me to learn from her experience. As a team and a church we want to acknowledge Karen for stepping up and giving us an opportunity to all learn from each other. Thank you Karen.

Friday Night Youth



Women's Fellowship

Following the success of Women's meetings on Zoom during lockdowns, a group of us decided to arrange monthly afternoon teas for the women of St Margaret's to meet and get to know one another better.

Unfortunately, our first planned event for the year in February (a trip to Piha) had to be rescheduled due to the rain but we had a very enjoyable afternoon tea and chat in the church café instead.

Thankfully, the weather in March was better and a group of us met in Monte Cecilia park for a picnic afternoon tea under the trees.

Our April get-together enabled us to hear from Kay about her time with YWAM ships doing volunteer medical work in Western Papua New Guinea.

In May Anne Segedin led us in a quiet "slow down" afternoon of guided reflection and prayer.

The women from the team who went to Bangladesh (Sarah, Florence and Marina) reported back to us in June. We heard about their experiences encouraging, supporting and helping the Operation Mobilisation team there who are planting churches, teaching literacy, computer and tailoring skills and working with children and young people from the slums.

This was followed in August by our third mission talk, when Juliette told to us about her 6- week Mission trip to Central Asia at the end of 2022.

We had a great time of sharing and testimony in September as we asked women to bring along a significant or favourite verse to share.

In October Sarah, Margot, Suzanne and Sandy led us in a creative afternoon of "Fun with flowers" where we learnt how to arrange flowers in a vase, create a table decoration, make a small floral gift and arrange flowers for church.

Finally, in November a team of 12 of us spent the afternoon making and assembling 46 packs of shortbread to be delivered to our church neighbours, along with an invitation to our Christmas services.

As we hoped, these have been times where women have enjoyed each other's company and got to know each other better.

Women's Bible Study

It was decided to offer an in-depth Bible study for women of all ages during 2023. Maidalynne Beazley, Barbara Murdoch and Muriel McIntyre, together with Lynnette Wood from St George's, shared the responsibility to facilitate a Beth Moore series: "Believing God: Experiencing a Fresh Explosion of Faith" which explored what it means to believe God and not just merely believe in Him. This was a video-based course along with a workbook for every participant. We broke out into small groups to discuss our homework. We had an average of 25 women, (including some from outside St Mags), who committed to this 10-week course meeting every alternate Saturday morning from 9.30 to 12.00. We avoided Saturdays in the public or school holidays, so it went from February until our final time in August.

From the feedback women found it invaluable for their personal lives and like "water to a thirsty soul". In response to this overwhelming enthusiasm for another Beth Moore series, this years course will be starting in May, 2024.

Men's Group Neil Bennett

The Men's group has been operating for the past six years. There are around 10 to 12 members who meet on a regular basis.

Our mission is to support and encourage and pray for each other in our Christian walk. Where possible, we provide "Men's" support to any church family and the church.

We meet on a Friday morning at church at 6:30. This gives us an opportunity to do some men's talk over a shared breakfast.

This year we did an outreach to St John's Church, Great Barrier Island. We had a Men's Breakfast on Saturday morning, there was a good attendance from the local men and a lot of prayer and ministry was done! On Sunday, we conducted the church service, which was well received.

It is encouraging to have a core group of men praying for the church.

St Margaret's became one of the first churches to join the Anglican Community of St Mark (ACM) in 2018. ACM's purpose is to have a community of theologically like-minded Anglican churches and individuals thus giving a legitimate and safe place within the Anglican Church. As an ACM parish, we have our theological heritage and future protected by Church law. This enables St Margaret's to minister and proclaim the gospel uninhibited by decisions that may be contrary to such.

ACM aims to help build hope-filled churches in Aotearoa, New Zealand and Polynesia. We endeavour to follow our calling to be a people of WORD and SPIRIT, discerning what the Holy Spirit is saying to the Church and responding in all humility.

Through:

- Continuing to develop a community of like-minded Christians with a sense of connectedness and relationship across Aotearoa, New Zealand and Polynesia
- 2) Building an active community of leaders within ACM and beyond
- 3) Partnering with those developing new worshipping communities and new models of church, taking their learning and sharing with others
- 4) Training and equipping leaders to strengthen the Church

- 5) Building for the future by progressing a leadership pathway to ordination
- 6) Assisting to strengthen churches that are struggling
- 7) Creating an active space for resource and wisdom sharing to bless the whole Church
- 8) Continuing to develop positive relationships with all our bishops and other denominational leaders and Church organisations where possible
- 9) Seeking relationship and community with the Three Tikanga Church, to share learning and community across the three tikanga, aiming to bring together all peoples of Aotearoa, New Zealand and Polynesia under the one banner of Jesus Christ
- 10) Actively connecting with all dioceses, all current and potential ACM church leaders and members, and any who are isolated.

Rev Fraser has an external role as NZ National Chairman of (ACM) and has been Chair for the last four years. This last year has seen him involved in:

- The development of national video lectures
- the steady growth of the network by welcoming and encouraging new churches
- development of international connections with the Anglican leaders in USA and Canada
- the planning for the delivery of our first conference in 2024 (Regen24)
- attendance of the AFFIRM Network board meetings
- attendance of the Nelson Diocesan Ministry Conference
- chairing of various standing committee meetings
- leading the community with setting vision and clarifying strategy

2024 looks to be a busy and strategic year for ACM both nationally and internationally as we start actively to engage with leaders of Tikanga Māori and Tikanga Pacifica. We are also doing our part in developing a worldwide network of like-minded Anglican Church leaders.

We remain very thankful for the oversight of our Protector Bishop, Steve Maina (+Nelson).

Cornelia (Corrie) Johanna VAN WERKUM 10/8/1927 - 24/11/2023


